Analiza prikazuje, kako so angleške sestavljene zloženke ve?inoma prevedene v slovenš?ino, pa tudi, s kakšnimi težavami se prevajalci sre?ujejo pri prevajanju angleških sestavljenih zloženek.

Adrian Mole is thirty-four and three quarters, almost officially middle-aged, when Mr Blair tells Parliament that weapons of mass destruction can be deployed in forty-five minutes and can reach Cyprus. Adrian is worried that he might not get a refund on his holiday. But that?s not all that is bothering him. There?s his odd girlfriend Marigold who has become distressingly New Age. This book puts forward an authenticity-centred approach to the design of materials for language learning. - Offers a set of practical principles for the design of authentic learning tasks.
- Includes a reference section providing step-by-step instruction for the design and classroom procedure of learning tasks for materials taken from each of the seven genres.
