This book re-examines the campaign experience of British soldiers in Africa during the period 1874-1902. It uses a range of sources, such as letters and diaries, to allow soldiers to 'speak for themselves' about their experience of colonial.

This book offers an account of this understudied conflict dating from the early stage of European colonialism in Africa, and unpacks the complex regional relationships between different communities in the first half of 19th century.
