This guide to good manners was produced by Lillian Watson in 1921 as a rewrite of the *Encyclopedia of Etiquette* by Emily Holt. Mining her own experience as a social misfit and would-be social climber for material, it was a huge hit with those aspiring to a grander station. Originally published in two volumes, but presented here in one combined edition, *The Book of Etiquette* covers: the secret of social success engagements and weddings the intricacies of the social call correspondence and invitations use of the napkin yachting parties for bachelors musicals and private theatricals some important rules about golf the charm of correct speech and much more... The only serious competitor to Emily Post as etiquette maven to America between the wars, LILLIAN EICHLER WATSON (b. 1902) was a 19-year-old copywriter for the book publisher Doubleday when she was commissioned to rewrite the outdated *Encyclopedia of Etiquette* by Emily Holt.

The author proposes that the depiction of meals has particular significance and resonance for women writers, and that these presentations of meals reflect larger concerns about women's domestic and public roles in a time of social and cultural change.

An idealized image of European concert-goers has long prevailed in historical overviews of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. This 1921 edition of her classic guide to excruciatingly proper behavior is a delightful throwback to a more elegant time.

Many otherwise enlightened people often dismiss etiquette as a trivial subject or—worse yet—as nothing but a disguise for moral hypocrisy or unjust social hierarchies. Such sentiments either mistakenly assume that most manners merely frame the “real issues” of any interpersonal exchange or are the ugly vestiges of outdated, unfair social arrangements. But in *On Manners*, Karen Stohr turns the tables on these easy prejudices, demonstrating that the scope of manners is much broader than most people realize and that manners lead directly to the roots of enduring ethical questions. Stohr suggests that though manners are mostly conventional, they are nevertheless authoritative insofar

as they are a primary means by which we express moral attitudes and commitments and carry out important moral goals. Drawing primarily on Aristotle and Kant and with references to a wide range of cultural examples—from Jane Austen's *Pride and Prejudice* to Larry David's *Curb Your Enthusiasm*—the author ultimately concludes that good manners are essential to moral character.
