

Chapter 4 Cells Cell Structure Cell Transport

Biomedical application of nanoparticles (NPs) is an emerging discipline within which electron microscopy (EM) is an essential tool for identifying intracellular location of NPs. NP dispersion, dissolution and dose internalised by cells and tissues can all be monitored and quantified by EM, but this will only be accurate with appropriate sample preparation. Preparation of cellular material for EM must consider the resolution of cellular ultrastructure while avoiding significant alteration or loss of target NPs. There are a wide range of EM imaging modes now available that have the pre-requisite spatial resolution and sensitivity to measure and quantify the position and number of NPs in a biological matrix. In addition, quantification of NP composition and the ionic content within intracellular compartments is possible by analytical EM. These techniques involve both scanning and transmission EM and cross the traditional boundaries between EM for the biological and physical scientists. This chapter aims to summarise the use of EM for the analysis of NPs in cells and tissues and will briefly discuss correlation with live cell imaging.

This volume is in two parts. The first contains the remaining chapters on cellular organelles and several chapters relating to organelle disorders. An account of mitochondriopathy is given in the chapter on the mitochondrion rather than in a separate one. The subject matter of this part of the volume shows quite clearly that the interdisciplinary approach to the study of organelles has shed considerable light on the nature of the mechanisms underlying the etiology and pathobiology of many of these disorders. As an example, mutations in the genes encoding integral membrane proteins are found to lead to disturbances in peroxisome

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assembly. It is also interesting and significant that mistargeting of protein is now thought to be another cause. It will be revealing to see whether mistargeting is the result of mutations in the genes encoding chaperones. The second part of the volume is concerned with the extracellular matrix. It sets out to show that a vast body of new knowledge of the extracellular matrix is available to us. Take for example the integrin family of cell adhesion receptors. It turns out that integrins play a key role not only in adhesion but also in coupling signals to the nucleus via the cytoskeleton. As for fibronectins, they seem to link the matrix with the cytoskeleton by interacting with integrins. Collagen molecules are dealt with in the last two chapters. The boundaries of collagen in disease are defined by drawing a clear line of demarcation between systemic connective tissue disorders (e.g., scleroderma), better known as autoimmune diseases, and the heritable, and the heritable diseases such as osteogenesis imperfect and the Marfan syndrome. This classification takes into account a second group of acquired disorders of collagen forming tissues in which regional fibrosis is the hallmark. Liver cirrhosis and pulmonary fibrosis are prime examples. The decision to place Volumes 2 and 3 before those dealing with cell chemistry was not easily made. It was based on the view that most students will have had an undergraduate course in biochemistry of cell biology or both courses, and that they could go to Volumes 4-7 in which the subject of cell chemistry is covered, and then return to Volumes 2 and 3.

The intent in initiating this volume was to bring together a series of essays which would define our present understanding of the endosome and lysosome and their interrelationship. 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conflicting data. We can trace and follow the flow of molecules. In this volume current molecular knowledge concerning the function and relationship of endosomes and lysosomes is presented. Because of this vast increase in knowledge of molecules, we have realized that endosomes in particular are very ephemeral organelles. In fact, endosomes may well not be discrete entities but rather continuously changing and evolving in their molecular composition. The dynamic nature of the relationship between endosomes and lysosomes is the unifying focus of the genetic, biochemical, microscopic, and molecular biological approaches described in the chapters which follow.

The compartmentation of genetic information is a fundamental feature of the eukaryotic cell. The metabolic capacity of a eukaryotic (plant) cell and the steps leading to it are overwhelmingly an endeavour of a joint genetic cooperation between nucleus/cytosol, plastids, and mitochondria. Alter ation of the genetic material in anyone of these compartments or exchange of organelles between species can seriously affect harmoniously balanced growth of an organism. Although the biological significance of this genetic design has been vividly evident since the discovery of non-Mendelian inheritance by Baur and Correns at the beginning of this century, and became

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indisputable in principle after Renner's work on interspecific nuclear/plastid hybrids (summarized in his classical article in 1934), studies on the genetics of organelles have long suffered from the lack of respectability. Non-Mendelian inheritance was considered a research sideline~if not a freak~by most geneticists, which becomes evident when one consults common textbooks. For instance, these have usually impeccable accounts of photosynthetic and respiratory energy conversion in chloroplasts and mitochondria, of metabolism and global circulation of the biological key elements C, N, and S, as well as of the organization, maintenance, and function of nuclear genetic information. Cellular communication is mediated by extracellular stimuli that bind cellular receptors and activate intracellular signaling pathways. Principal biochemical reactions used for signal transduction are protein or lipid phosphorylation, proteolytic cleavage, protein degradation and complex formation mediated by

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protein-protein interactions. Within the nucleus, signaling pathways regulate transcription factor activity and gene expression. Cells differ in their competence to respond to extracellular stimuli. A deeper understanding of complex biological responses cannot be achieved by traditional approaches but requires the combination of experimental data with mathematical modeling. Following a systems biology approach, data-based mathematical models describing sub-modules of signaling pathways have been established. By combining computer simulations with experimental verification systems properties of signaling pathway including cycling behavior or threshold response could be identified. Yet, to analyze complex growth and maturation processes at a systems level and quantitatively predict the outcome of perturbations further advances in experimental and theoretical methodologies are required.
