Essays debate the best ways to prevent date rape, discussing the role of the man and the woman in rape.

My dissertation is an examination of the controversial topic of date rape, established as an issue of grave concern by feminists in the seventies. In the ensuing two decades, date rape discourse and debates proliferated at a variety of sites, including established institutions like the university and in popular culture media such as daytime television talk shows and made-for-television movies. Using a materialist feminist methodological framework that draws on the work of Nancy Fraser, Lynne Segal and Maria Mies, Chapter One traces the coalescence of date rape as a concept to sixties and seventies "second wave" feminists. My argument begins this chapter as an interrogation of "rape theory" put forth by these feminists. The broad shift from collective materialist feminism to cultural feminism occurring at this time sets up a troublesome victim-centered concentration that can be seen through date rape's many instantiations. Chapter Two establishes the feminist intellectual and historical context out of which date rape emerges in the eighties, in part by looking at the organization of the rape crisis center, the Ms. articles that propelled the issue toward a wider audience, and the process of institutionalization in the academy. Chapter Three engages close readings of videos, produced at various universities, intended to instruct college students how to prevent date rape. Chapters Four and Five examine the television genres of the daytime talk show and the made-for-television movie, two venues which mobilize date and acquaintance rape discourse in the service of therapeutic issues and victims' rights, respectively. Through this broad but not exhaustive survey of rape discourse, I contend that date rape has been constructed as a classed issue, acknowledging only the victimage of middle-class young (and pretty) white women, and that the repetitive victim focus deflects attention away from potential perpetrators, thus reproducing a patriarchal structure that is well known: women are responsible when and where blame is to be assigned.
