Through Hesse's hagiographical lens, I explore the emergence and evolution of Hesse's modern saint who is shaped by Hesse's quest to resolve his lifelong internal conflict between art and religion. In Hesse's later novel, Narcissus and Goldmund, he finalizes his spiritual experiment with the modern saint who unifies sensuality and spirituality a figure whom Hesse represents with Goldmund. Whether this modern saint is merely an ideal, or if he is possibly a figure that can contribute to the spiritual life of the everyday individual will be answered in the conclusion of this thesis.
