

## Songs Unsung

After a catastrophic and undetermined skin disease causing his inability to play live music, Omar Dykes pulled himself out of having the blues and wrote a provocative book that includes 44 original unrecorded songs in lyrical form. Although it is not the format that we expect from the legendary blues artist and front man for the Texas band, Omar and the Howlers, the song lyrics read like poetry and continue to provide compelling and humorous entertainment for die-hard global fans and new fans alike. Dykes includes personal notes for each song to give the reader background and insight into his inspiration for writing each song and what the melody would sound like if the song was recorded in a studio. Omar shares this collection of songs with his family, friends, and fans in case he is unable to record them in the future. *Ballad of Old Leather Butt* is the next best thing to hearing Omar perform these songs in person at a live music venue.

Martha Palmer, an aspiring singer working in a coffee shop, is desperately short of cash. She's been scouted by a photographer. The money's good. But there's a catch ...Sussex 1976. Nothing much happens in teenager Natasha James' life. Her mother has taken to her bed and her

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father, the local doctor, is preoccupied with his patients. But when the magnetic Martha Palmer moves into her village, Natasha is drawn into a glittery world of extravagant parties, steeped in the embroidered rhythms of jazz. But who is the mysterious Martha Palmer? And why is she the keeper of so many secrets? Desperate to fill in the gaps of Martha's past, Natasha uncovers a heart-breaking love story, the truth of which threatens to destroy all that she holds dear.

Britain, long revered for its choral music and partsongs, had largely neglected art songs since the Elizabethan era. The middle of the nineteenth century witnessed efforts to revive the genre, particularly in the works of Sir C. Hubert Parry and Sir Charles Villiers Stanford. The following generation, including the Scottish composer Hamish MacCunn (1868–1916), built on the foundations laid by Parry and Stanford and served as the bridge to the vocal music of Ralph Vaughan Williams, Sir Edward Elgar, Ivor Gurney, John Ireland, and ultimately Benjamin Britten. Though best known for his Scottish-influenced compositions, MacCunn composed over 100 songs that, free from national constraints, are some of the most refined and sophisticated examples of his music. Almost no modern editions of MacCunn's song exist, though many were published during the composer's lifetime. The current two-part edition presents the composer's 102 extant songs. Part 1 contains 53 individual songs; Part 2 presents the songs that were first published as small collections.

Samuella Conteh's THE UNSUNG SONG is a collection of poems with a rallying call for global peace; a hymnal of religious tolerance and a praise-song celebrating the joys of motherhood; an anthem to patriotism and a jingle for social justice; particularly, the roles and rights of women and youths. It is rather ironic to think of these sonnets, elegies and lyrics as 'Unsung Songs' when most of them have already been prize winning poems that have featured in online publications and magazines in and out of Africa. Is it not equally strange to think of Samuella Conteh herself as an 'Unsung' poet, when she is serving as an ambassador of poetry, adding many accolades to her growing trophies on her mental piece? True to the nature of this poet, humility is a recurrent theme throughout this orchestra of peace that calms our turbulent world, while serenading the hearts and minds of all readers as they join the poet in her soulful requiem evoking the 'unsung songs' of humanity. Despite his importance and influence, jazz musician, educator, and community leader Horace Tapscott remains relatively unknown to most Americans. In Songs of the Unsung Tapscott shares his life story, recalling his childhood in Houston, moving with his family to Los Angeles in 1943, learning music, and his early professional career. He describes forming the Pan Afrikan Peoples Arkestra in 1961 and later the Union of God's Musicians and Artists Ascension to preserve African American music and serve the community. Tapscott also recounts his

interactions with the Black Panthers and law enforcement, the Watts riots, his work in Hollywood movie studios, and stories about his famous musician-activist friends. *Songs of the Unsung* is the captivating story of one of America's most unassuming heroes as well as the story of L.A.'s cultural and political evolution over the last half of the twentieth century.
