The writer, scientist, philosopher, and radical democrat Georg Büchner (1813-1837) occupies a unique place in the cultural legacy of the German-speaking countries. Born into an epoch of inevitable, yet arrested historical transition, Büchner produced a small but exceptionally rich body of work. This collection of essays in English and in German considers the full spectrum of his writings, the political pamphlet *Der Hessische Landbote*, the dramas *Danton's Tod*, *Leonce und Lena*, *Woyzeck*, and the fragmentary narrative *Lenz*, as well as the letters, the philosophical lectures on Descartes and Spinoza, and the scientific texts.
