Originally conceived as the sequel to his 1961 *The Long Revolution*, Williams' 1983 title *Towards 2000* has been unfairly classified as a period piece. With the permission of the Williams Estate, the book has been re-entitled *A Short Counter-Revolution – Towards 2000 Revisited*, with noted Williams expert Jim McGuigan adding a chapter that updates the original with a survey of developments since its publication, particularly concerning the impact of neoliberalism, a phenomenon sighted early by Raymond Williams and named 'Plan X'. This edited collection brings to light the rare virtues and uncommon merits of Raymond Aron, the main figure of French twentieth-century liberalism. *The Companion to Raymond Aron* is an essential supplement to Aron's autobiography *Mémoires* (1984) and main works, exploring the substance of his political, sociological, and philosophical thought.

This volume contains Raymond J. Carroll's research and commentary on its impact by leading statisticians. The seven subject areas reviewed in this book were chosen by Ray himself, as were the articles representing each area. The commentaries not only review Ray's work, but are also filled with history and anecdotes. Raymond J. Carroll's impact on statistics and numerous other fields of science is far-reaching. His vast catalog of work spans from fundamental contributions to statistical theory to innovative methodological development and new insights in disciplinary science. From the outset of his career, rather than taking the "safe" route of pursuing incremental advances, Ray has focused on tackling the most important challenges. In doing so, it is fair to say that he has defined a host of statistics areas, including weighting and transformation in regression, measurement error modeling, quantitative methods for nutritional epidemiology and non- and semiparametric regression.
