In September of 1901 London's New Grand Opera House flung open its doors. In *The Visit*, for instance, an old lady who becomes the wealthiest person in the world returns to the village that cast her out as a young woman and offers riches to the town in exchange for the life of the man, now its mayor, who once disgraced her. Joel Agee's crystalline translation gives a fresh lease to this play, as well as four others: *The Physicists*, *Romulus the Great*, *Hercules and the Augean Stables*, and *The Marriage of Mr. Mississippi*. Dürrenmatt has long been considered a great writer - but one unfairly neglected in the modern world of letters. With these elegantly conceived and expertly translated volumes, a new generation of readers will rediscover his greatest works.

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resemblance to an infamous Nazi war criminal, a suspicion begins to gnaw away at him - could they be one and the same person? Determined to expose the monster behind the surgeon's mask, the ailing inspector checks himself into the doctor's exclusive clinic. But all does not go to plan, and soon Barlach realizes that he is at the mercy of his own prey. Will he find a way out before it's too late? Friedrich Dürrenmatt (1921-1990) was a Swiss author and dramatist, most famous for his plays *The Visit* and *The Physicists*, which earned him a reputation as one of the greatest playwrights in the German language. He also wrote four highly regarded crime novels - *The Pledge*, *The Judge and His Hangman*, *Suspicion* and *The Execution of Justice*, all of which will be published by Pushkin Vertigo.

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The thirty chapters of this innovative international study are all devoted to the topic of the play within the play. The authors explore the wide range of aesthetic, literary-theoretical and philosophical issues associated with this rhetorical device, not only in terms of its original meta-theatrical setting – from the baroque idea of a *theatrum mundi* onward to contemporary examples of postmodern self-referential dramaturgy – but also with regard to a

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variety of different generic applications, e.g. in narrative fiction, musical theatre and film. The authors, internationally recognized specialists in their respective fields, draw on recent debates in such areas as postcolonial studies, game and systems theories, media and performance studies, to analyze the specific qualities and characteristics of the play within the play: as ultimate affirmation of the 'self' (the 'Hamlet paradigm'), as a self-reflective agency of meta-theatrical discourse, and as a vehicle of intermedial and intercultural transformation. The challenging study, with its underlying premise of play as a key feature of cultural anthropology and human creativity, breaks new ground by placing the play within the play at the centre of a number of intersecting scholarly discourses on areas of topical concern to scholars in the humanities.

Set in a small town in Switzerland, *The Pledge* centers around the murder of a young girl and the detective who promises the victim's mother he will find the perpetrator. After deciding the wrong man has been arrested for the crime, the detective lays a trap for the real killer, with all the patience of a master fisherman. But cruel turns of plot conspire to make him pay dearly for his pledge, leading to a chilling conclusion.

Until now the three novels written by Daniel Fuchs in the 1930s have received critical attention primarily as Jewish or Depression-period writing. Pointing up the limitations of this perspective, this study demonstrates Fuch's distinctive merging of epistemological and artistic

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skepticism, and investigates the dynamics of his offering social criticism while he subverts the univocality of any position.

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
