There are urgent lessons for education, the political process of decision-making on science and technology, our relationship with the global environment, and the way that

He then expands on this theme to explore how virtue applies to the goals of higher education in essays such as *Ethical Character Development and Personal and Academic Excellence*. In thinking through the concept of virtue and how it applies to consciousness, education, and the future, Dr. Lombardo emphasizes the one key virtue—wisdom—that provides the center of gravity around which all other character virtues revolve. Indeed, if any one concept unites the majority of essays in this collection, it is wisdom. In *The Wisdom of Future Consciousness*, the author argues that wisdom is the highest expression of future consciousness, and systematically describes the numerous connections between wisdom and heightened future consciousness. Further, according to the author, wisdom is the key ideal that we should model and teach within education, now and in the future. This argument
